

### **Rev Cait Writes**



Advent is well known as a time of preparation, but we are well versed in this season now. We all have our traditions; making the cake by this date, sending cards and gifts by that date, putting the tree and lights up, we may have asked people for a list of gift ideas, we have written family, friends and work nights out in the calendar. We start to plan that special meal and even what we are going to do for New Year's Eve.

By my time of life Advent is a well-oiled machine. The services have been in the diary since the Summer and by Advent Sunday, I have known what I was doing every day for the whole of December for many years. It's a very busy time but predictable as clockwork.

This year, however, is different. The services are in the diary but I stand removed from them. There is a house move on the horizon, but there has been a hiccup in the process and I don't know when we will move. I have no idea what will happen or when, and it feels, on the surface, a little "un-Christmassy".

As I contemplated this uncertainty, I thought about what being unprepared for Christmas means theologically. I have spoken so many times about stripping Christmas down to the true meaning of the season. Traditionally, the decorations would not go up until Christmas Eve, as the world welcomes Christ; the light of the world into the darkness and it is that light which is sewn into the season – not a tiny single light amongst thousands of twinkling lights that we can turn off with the press of a switch, but a light which begins with the birth of a small child in lowly circumstances, amidst the agonized screams of a teenaged girl, as animals press in on the scene and weather-worn field labourers drop by to visit.

Over the course of 2,000 years that light has grown in the hearts of millions of people, from the most earnestly devout to those who simply get caught up in the excitement of this era known as "The Season".

I wonder, was this the plan? The first Christmas seemed chaotic – no room available, no baby clothes ready washed and folded, no family on hand, no decorations, no gifts, no feast prepared, just two young people, waiting to greet the Son of God, and yet, despite their apparent unpreparedness, it was perfect; everyone played their part; everything came to pass as God had declared.

Our Christmas, or indeed our futures, may seem uncertain, yet God will ensure that it is perfect, whatever or however we celebrate. We may encounter another mouth to feed, or a screaming teenager, the great unwashed may knock on the door; visitors you had not planned to see. It seems that no matter how organized our Christmases may be, the only way to experience the season is with a certain amount of resignation to the uncertainty, the unexpected, the disruption of Jesus Christ in our lives.

As Mottram Church faces another interregnum, another winter without heating and much uncertainty, I ask you to face it with the certainty that this will not be the last time that Jesus disrupts the life of the church. It will not be the last time you may feel uncertain or even uncomfortable in your pursuit of drawing closer to your God. The church is a living, breathing body. Bodies are unpredictable, they often do things which make us uncomfortable, sometimes embarrassing, or noisy and sometimes downright irritating, but they are beautifully and lovingly created by God. They are perfect in His eyes.

So, I want to wish you, from the bottom of my heart a very messy, unpredictable and perfect Christmas.

"The swimming will be the most difficult challenge as that equates to 131 miles, but I am determined to do it and raise much-needed funds for a great cause that is very important to the local community."

### **Christmas Greetings**

Christmas cards have a history which may surprise you: their origins are not of the Church, but of the Post Office and railways.

Of course 'Christmas Greetings' had been around for hundreds of years in private letters. The earliest such letter on record was written in England in 1534.



In 1611 a HUGE Christmas card made a one-off appearance.

It measured a whopping 33" by 24", and was given to King James I of England (King James VI of Scotland). It featured a rose, four poems, a song, and a Christmas message for the king and his son.

1843 saw the creation of Christmas cards as we know them. One enterprising man was responsible for this; Sir Henry Cole, a civil servant who had helped launch the 'Public Record Office', now the Post Office.

Sir Henry Cole helped to introduce the Penny Post. Until then, only the rich could afford the Post, but with the arrival of the railways, which carried far more packages than horses and carts (and went much faster), suddenly the Penny Post became possible.

Sir Henry wanted to encourage 'ordinary' people to use the new service. He came up with the bright idea of a creating a simple card that people could send each other for Christmas. His friend, John Horsley, an artist, designed a three-panel card. Two panels depicted people caring for the poor, the middle one showed a family Christmas dinner.

They printed about 1,000 cards that first year, and advertised under the slogan: 'Just published, a Christmas Congratulations Card, or picture emblematical of old English festivity to perpetuate kind recollections between dear friends!'

The cards sold for one shilling each and could be posted to friends and family for a penny. There was a warm response from the public.

By the early 1900s, the custom had spread across Europe.

The first cards usually included a Nativity, and in late Victorian times, robins and snow-scenes. Robins were chosen because the postmen were nick-named 'Robin Postmen', because of their red uniforms.




